#### FINDING THE BALANCE

MASS DATES

Most evangelising groups claim to believe in the bible. Some knock on doors, others stand on street corners asking if you read the bible or they quote heavy scriptural texts. They take words of scripture as their benchmark and proofs of what they are teaching. Problems

arise though when we have to decide on how we interpret the words of the Bible - do we take them literally, morally, Allegorically or Anagogically. And that's where the rub is. There can be no doubt that the type of poverty which crushes people, prevents them from having access to the ordinary means of existence - leading to social conditions which marginalise people and keep them from being part of mainstream society was not the one favoured by Christ.

For example; His words in our gospel today "Happy are you who are poor" and "Alas for you who are rich". Do we treat it literally and say that only people who live in material poverty can be truly happy? Are all rich people in for a shock? Or do we interpret it to mean that he is talking about spiritual poverty which thus adheres to his central message of living a full life, about releasing people and restoring them to their true dignity.

And since poverty is a relative thing and is conditioned partly by the part of the globe we happen to have been born in, he must have had something deeper in mind.

Am I exercising poverty if I do without my gin and tonic while others die of hunger? Or do I have to give everything away? Am I living the gospel precept of poverty if I become detached from whatever keeps me from serving God? Should I start to worry if I find that I seem to have landed on my feet? What does it mean to be poor? How poor am I and should I be happy about it?

## First Reading: A reading from the prophet Jeremiah [17:5-8]

Cursed is the man who trusts in man: blessed is the man who trusts in the Lord. Thus says the Lord: 'Cursed is the man who trusts in man and makes flesh his strength, whose heart turns away from the Lord. He is like a shrub in the desert, and shall not see any good come. He shall dwell in the parched places of the wilderness, in an uninhabited salt land.

He is like a tree planted by water, that sends out its roots by the stream, and does not fear when heat comes, for its leaves remain green, and is not anxious in the year of drought, for it does not cease to bear fruit.' ## Responsorial Psalm 40(39 [Ps 1:1-2. 3. 4, 6. r5a] Response: Blessed the man who has placed his trust in the Lord.

Blessed indeed is the man who follows not the counsel of the wicked. nor stands in the path with sinners, nor abides in the company of scorners, but whose delight is the law of the Lord, and who ponders his law day and night.

He is like a tree that is planted beside the flowing waters, that yields its fruit in due season, and whose leaves shall never fade: and all that he does shall prosper.

**Corinthians** [15:12. 16-20] If Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile. Brothers and Sisters: If Christ is proclaimed as raised from the dead, how can some of you say that there is no resurrection of the dead? For if the dead are not raised, not even Christ has been raised. And if Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile and you are still in your sins. Then those also who have fallen asleep in Christ have perished. If in Christ we have hope in this life only, we are of all people most to be pitied. But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep.

Alleluia, alleluia. Rejoice and leap for joy, says the Lord, for behold, your reward is great in heaven. Alleluia.

Blessed are you who are poor. Woe to you who are rich.
