LENT

MASS DATES

The 40 days of Lent come around every year, but the Church has three different routes to Easter which it takes in a three-year cycle. This year (Year C) we have St Luke as our principal guide and he takes us along the route to Holy Week, introducing us to all sorts of different characters and scenery. Luke's Lent is about repentance and forgiveness. On the first

Sunday of Lent we encounter a troubled Jesus, troubled by the devil who is trying to tempt him. Jesus experienced every temptation that we have, in order to rise above our human weakness. In Christ there is no temptation that we cannot overcome. The second Sunday of Lent shows us the other side to Jesus, his divine transfigured side, and promises us that by following him we too will come to see God's glory. A sombre warning comes on the third Sunday of Lent that we cannot keep putting things off. Lent is a time for action and for conversion of heart. We cannot presume that we will always have a tomorrow in which to sort things out. Luke's story of the prodigal son on the fourth Sunday of Lent tells us just the sort of God we are journeying with. No matter how much we may wander from God, God will never abandon us. Lent is a time for coming back to life, for responding, for celebration. The fifth Sunday of Lent presents the woman taken in adultery and is a lesson to us that there is no sin which is outside God's mercy. While the law would condemn us, if we return to God there is nothing but forgiveness. So, Luke's Lent is a call to celebrate this joyful season of repentance and forgiveness in preparation for the wonders we await at Easter.

LITURGY OF THE WORD

First Reading: A reading from the book of Ecclesiasticus [27:4-7]

Do not praise a man before you hear him reason.

When a sieve is shaken, the refuse appears; so a person's filth in his thoughts. The kiln tests the potter's vessels; likewise the test of a person is in his reasoning. The fruit discloses the cultivation of a tree; so the expression of a thought discloses the cultivation of a person's mind.

Do not praise a man before you hear him reason, for this is the test of people.

Responsorial Psalm [Ps 92(91):2-3. 13-14. 15-16. V2a] *Response*: It is good to give thanks to you, O Lord.

It is good to give thanks to the LORD, to make music to your name, O Most High, to proclaim your loving mercy in the morning, and your truth in the watches of the night.

The just one will flourish like the palm tree, and grow like a Lebanon cedar. Planted in the house of the LORD, they will flourish in the courts of our God.

Still bearing fruit when they are old, still full of sap, still green, to proclaim that the LORD is upright. In him, my rock, there is no wrong.

Second Reading: A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the

Corinthians [15:54-58] He gives us the victory through Jesus Christ.

Brothers and Sisters: When the perishable puts on the imperishable, and the mortal puts on immortality, then shall come to pass the saying that is written: 'Death is swallowed up in victory.' 'O death, where is your victory? O death, where is your sting?'

The sting of death is sin, and the power of sin is the law. But thanks be to God, who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ. Therefore, my beloved brothers and sisters, be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that in the Lord your labour is not in vain.

Alleluia, alleluia Shine as lights in the world, holding fast to the word of life Alleluia

Gospel: A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke [6:39-45]

Out of the abundance of the heart the mouth speaks.

At that time: Jesus told his disciples a parable: 'Can a blind man lead a blind man? Will they not both fall into a pit? A disciple is not above his teacher, but everyone when he is fully trained will be like his teacher. Why do you see the speck that is in your brother's eye, but do not notice the log that is in your own eye? How can you say to your brother, "Brother, let me take out the speck that is in your eye", when you yourself do not see the log that is in your own eye? You hypocrite! First take the log out of your own eye, and then you will see clearly to take out the speck that is in your brother's eye.

'For no good tree bears bad fruit, nor again does a bad tree bear good fruit, for each tree is known by its own fruit. For figs are not gathered from thorn bushes, nor are grapes picked from a bramble bush. The good person out of the good treasure of his heart produces good, and the evil person out of his evil treasure produces evil, for out of the abundance of the heart his mouth speaks.'

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
